TO THE GRADUATES

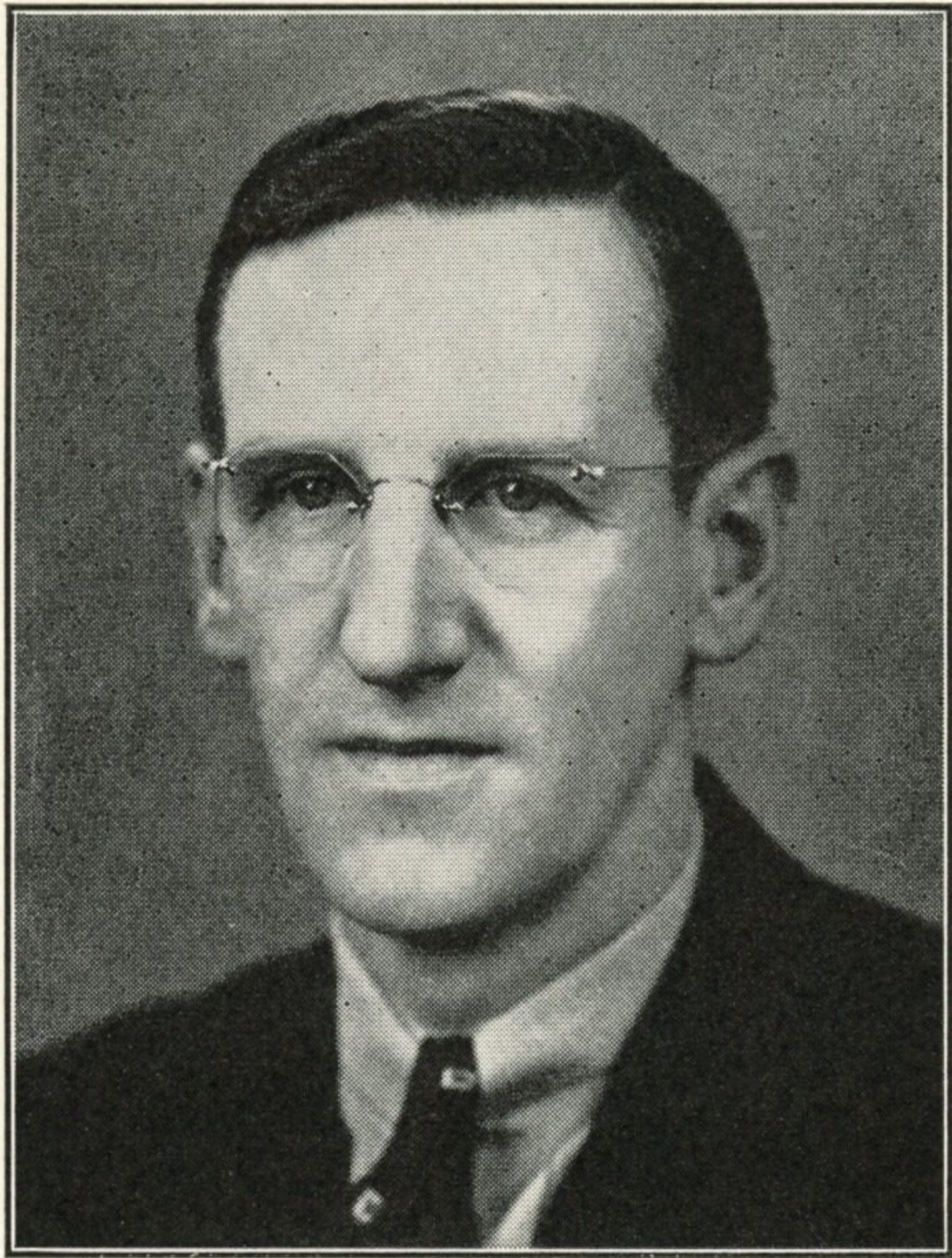

Sports hold little interest for Daniel except as a spectator. Although his plans for the future are indefinite, we know that his willingness will be helpful in whatever he undertakes.

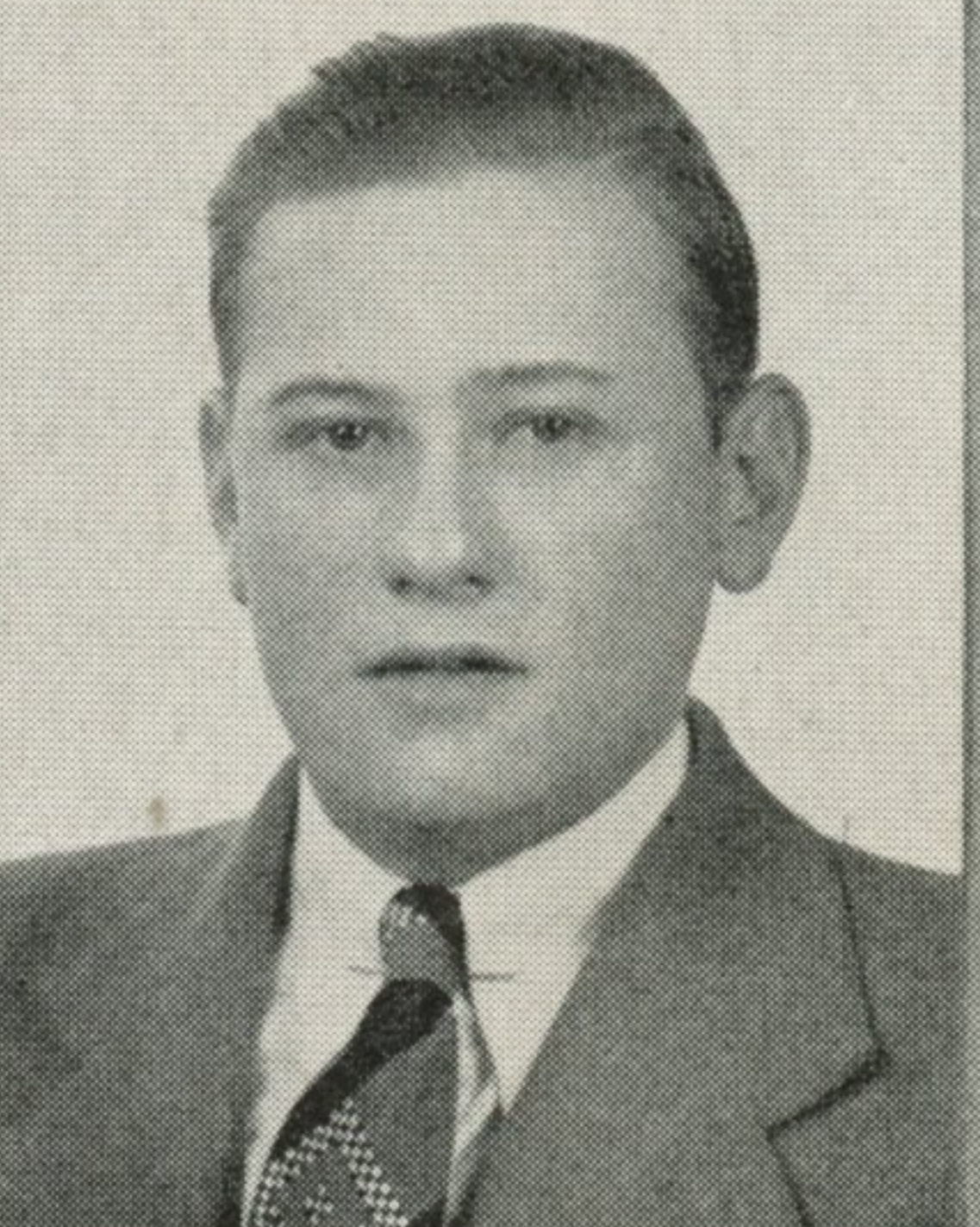

Although four of our members, George Yohe, Evelyn Sterner, Dale Brenneman, and George Brandt, have already discontinued their school work and Robert King has been transferred to East Berlin High School, we hope that the rest of us may remain united until we will be called "alumni of C. T. H. S."

We wish to thank all of the members of the Science Club and wish you much success in the future years.

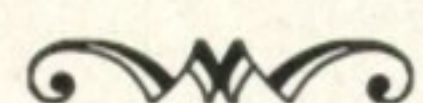

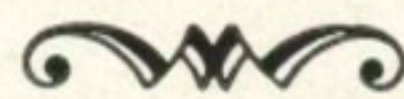

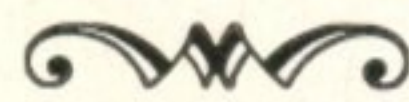

Lieut. Leese is married, and his wife is residing in Franklin, Ind.

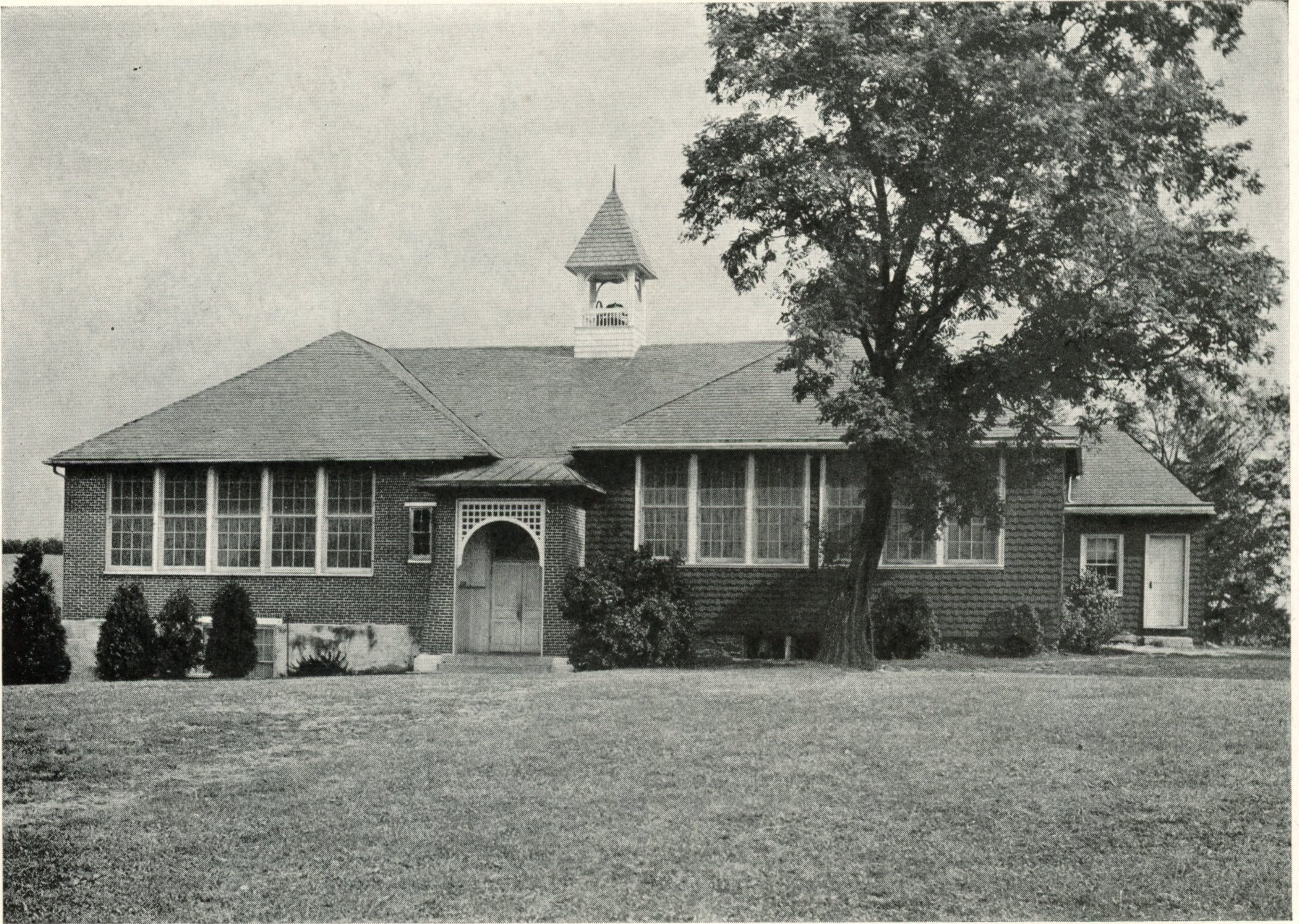
