



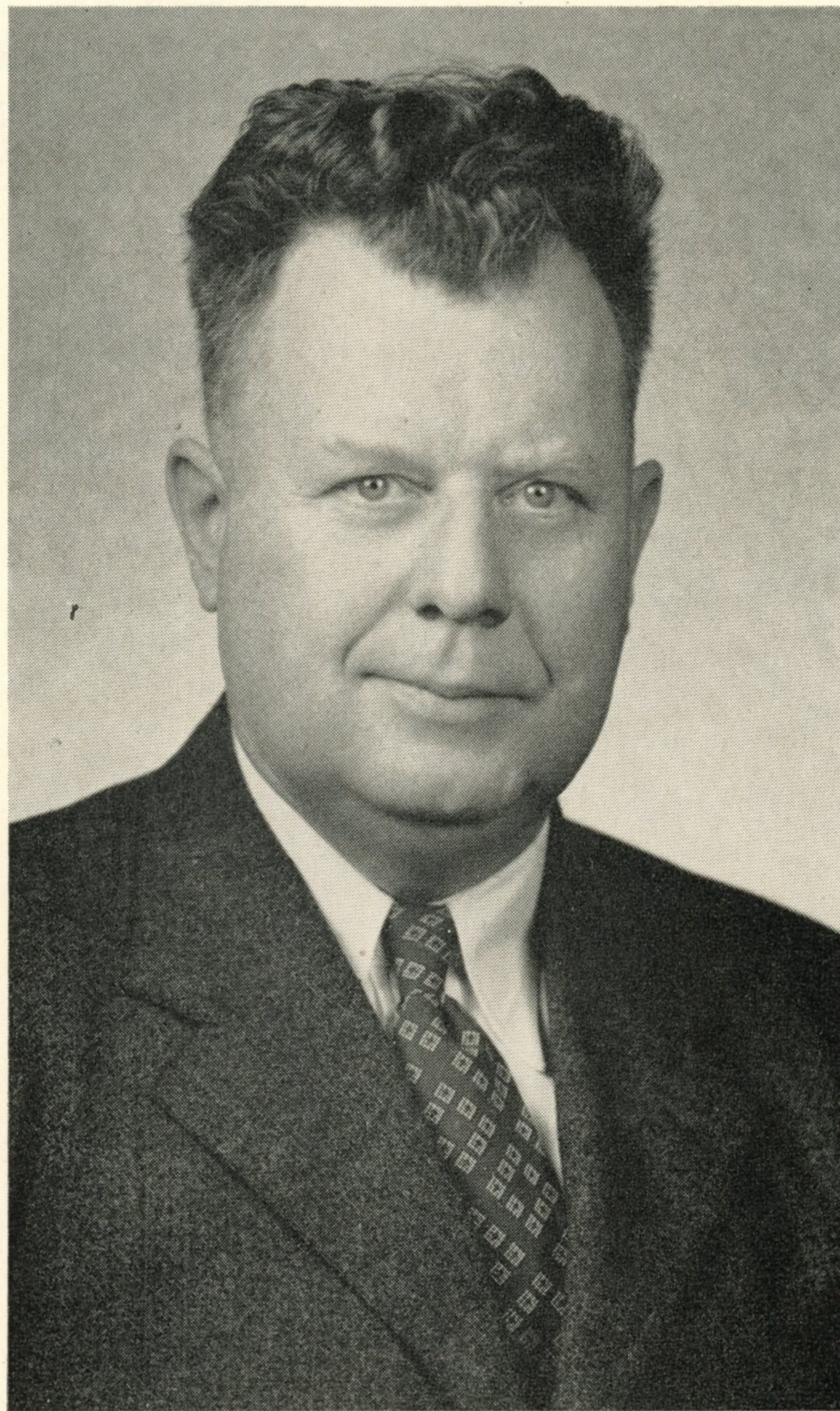

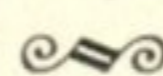

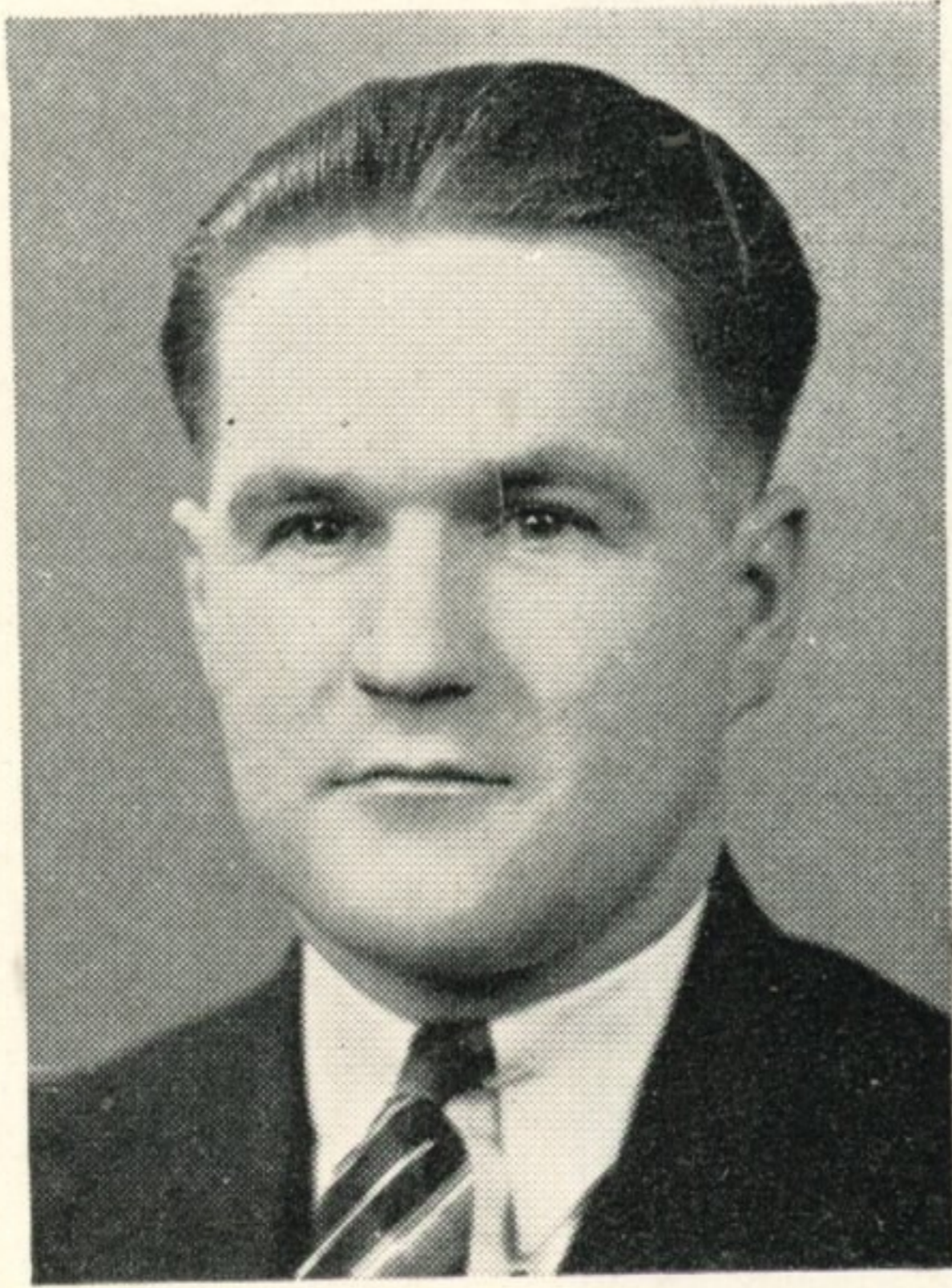


## Message to the Graduates

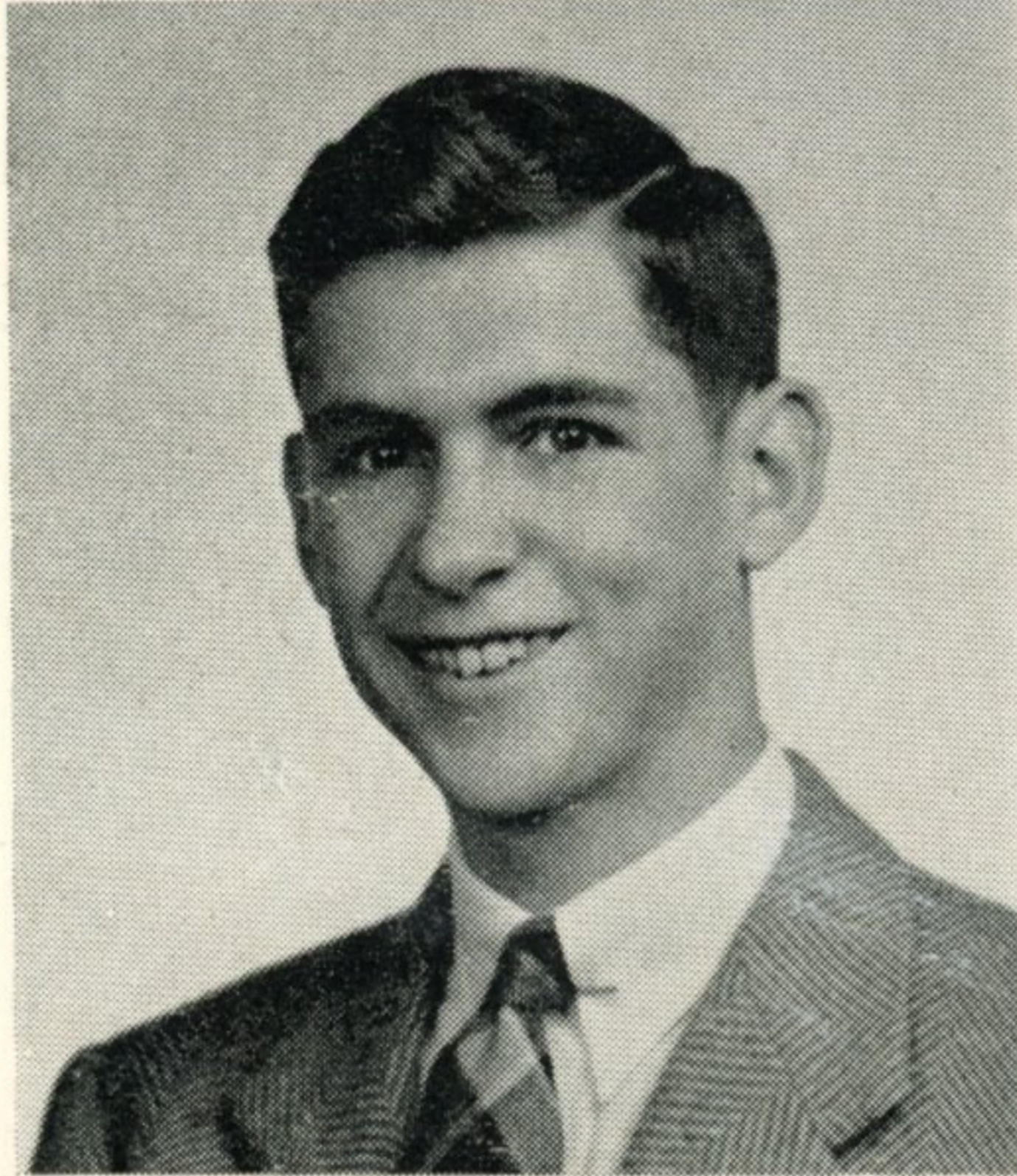
Meet "Schroll," one of the happy lasses of the class. Her laughter can be heard through the halls and in the classrooms of C. T. H. S.

Leander G. Hamme graduated in 1943 and then enlisted for three years in the navy. He will soon get his discharge, but he is not sure what he wants to do when he returns home.

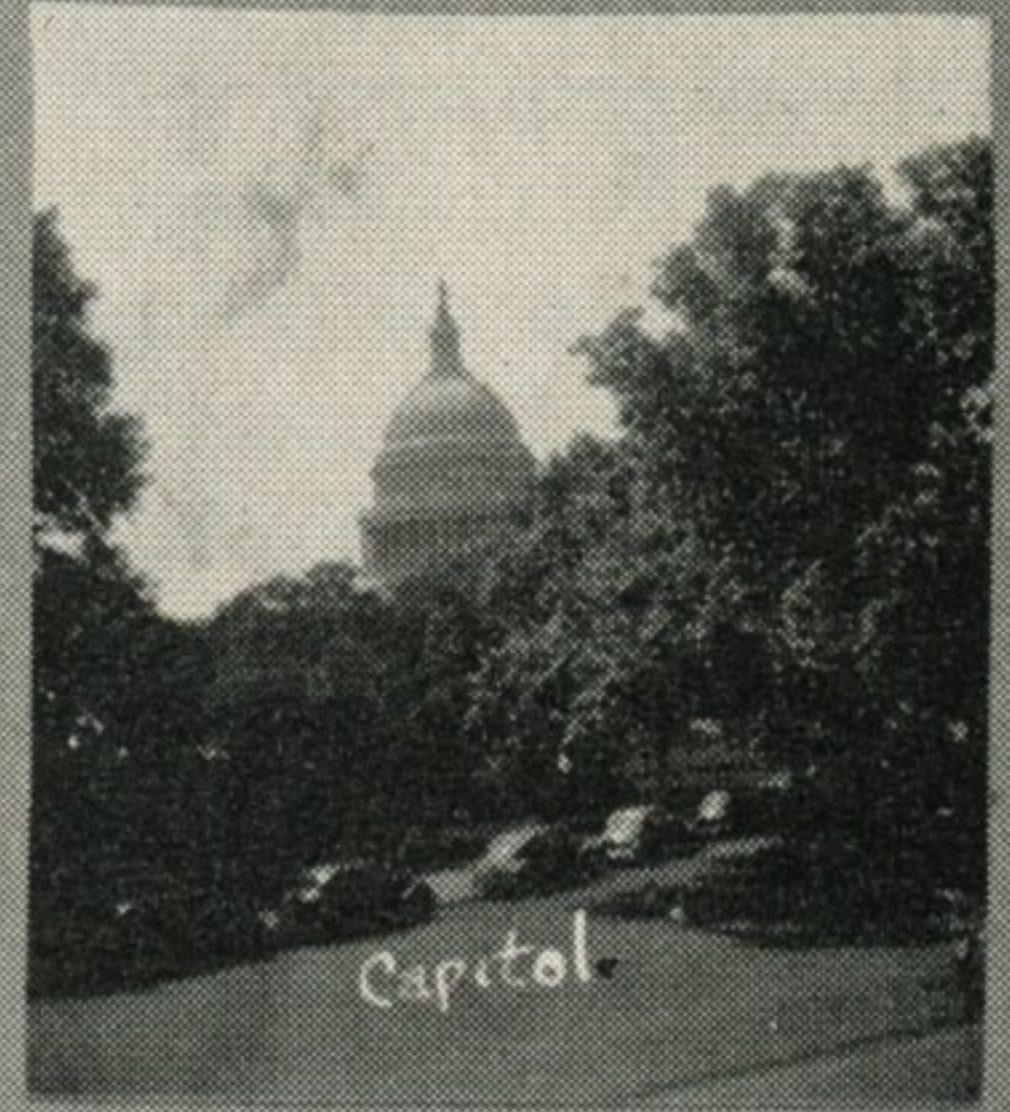
