

## Codorus Pollution Called Deterrent To Site For Park

Water in creek at Indian Rock dam area would be 'in fine shape' if P. H. Glatfelter company did not use stream, state official says. Federal government seen willing to make land available for recreation.

"The Indian Rock dam area is not being considered by the county commissioners as a possible site for a new county park and recreation area because there is not enough water without the Codorus creek—and it's polluted," Commissioner Horace M. Grove said yesterday.

At the same time, Ralph Rhoads, chief of stream quality control for the state Health department, said, "It is safe to say that if the P. H. Glatfelter paper company did not use the Codorus creek water it would be in fine shape in the area of the Indian Rock dam."

Lt. Col. S. D. Falkenberg Jr., Baltimore, deputy district engineer with the Army Corps of Engineers, said, "I understand from sources that are very reliable, and past history indicates that we have tried to turn the 1,700 acres owned by the federal government in the Indian Rock dam area over to the state."

He said, "It has been our policy to foster and encourage recreational use of this type land and there are many examples of similar turnovers throughout the state."

R. E. B. Sharp, chairman of Greater York Planning commission, had suggested the Indian Rock Dam area as an alternative to the 1,500-acre site in Windsor township which was rejected by the commissioners (Continued on Page Thirty-Four)
